I am pleased to submit to you for review the Sterling Police Department 2016 Annual Report.

It has been a whirlwind of a first year for me as Chief of Police. I have overseen the resignation of four officers with the hiring of the exact same number. The challenge of hiring and retention continues to be a huge issue, but I truly believe I see light at the end of the tunnel. With the implementation of an updated employment contract and the hiring of a few previously certified officers, I believe the incentive to remain here is greater than ever.

The goals I set forth for the department last year in regards to Community Policing are coming together nicely. We entered into a partnership with Sterling Schools to co-teach the 2nd Step curriculum in 3rd and 5th grade classes at Lincoln and Washington schools. Eighteen sworn officers, including command staff, are taking part in weekly classes at the schools, greatly increasing our positive contact presence with the children.

Looking to the future, our community dog program will be up and running this spring. It is my hope that the program will further our efforts in seeking out positive, uplifting contact with the citizens of Sterling. The old adage, we deal with 10 percent of the people 90 percent of the time and 90 percent of the people only 10 percent of the time needs to change. We need positive police contact with more and more people in order to develop and foster trust between officers and citizens.

Thank you once again to Support Services Supervisor Claudia Garcia and her staff who pulled this report together. Additionally, I would like to thank all the city workers, community members and city officials for the support they have shown the department and me during this past year, further proving that Sterling is a great community to live and work.






Sterling Police Department Accidents by Day of the Week



E911

The Whiteside County 911 System is an Enhanced 911 or E911 system. This means that the caller location and call back number are provided to the dispatcher at the time the call is placed.

There are three 911 Public Safety Answering Points or PSAP's in Whiteside County. Depending on the location of the caller, 911 calls are answered at the Whiteside County Sheriff's Office, the Sterling Police or Rock Falls Police Departments. From there the appropriate Police, Fire or EMS agency is dispatched to handle the call. The CGH Dispatch Center is considered a secondary PSAP, as 911 calls are not answered there directly, however any of the three PSAP's can transfer 911 calls to them requiring Sterling Fire, Rock Falls Fire or CGH EMS services.

Our 911 system has the ability to plot the incoming call by location on a GIS based map to further help in locating the emergency and determining what agencies should be dispatched to handle the call. Landline calls are plotted on the map based on the address associated with the phone service. Cellular calls use different technologies to provide latitude/longitude coordinates with the caller information and that is then used to plot the location on the map.

New technologies like VoIP – voice over internet protocol or cable phone service, should provide caller information during a 911 call, but this may depend on the service provider. Also, some of these services are not required to support 911.

Newer technologies that may be able to contact 911 in the future are text messaging, picture messaging or any other new services that may be created.











DEA PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE-BACK PROGRAM

The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) has held seven National Prescription Drug Take-Back events since starting the program in 2010. This is a great way for people to safely dispose of unwanted unused prescription drugs that they have accumulated.

In the previous Take-Back events, DEA in conjunction with the state, local, and tribal law enforcement partners collected more than 2.8 million pounds (1,409 tons) of medication from circulation.

The National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day aims to provide a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposal, while also educating the general public about the potential for abuse of these medications and the potential harm to our water source if disposed of irresponsibly.

The Sterling Police Department has participated in all eight of the events in cooperation with the DEA. In 2016, the Sterling Police Department collected over 307 pounds of prescription medication. This is the 3rd highest collection since the start of the program.

The Sterling Police Department has collected over 1,500 pounds of drugs over the past five years.



Information Technology



City of Sterling Information Technology

The information technology staff at the Sterling Police Department consists of Sgt. Ken Wright, I.T. Manager Kory Froeter and I.T. Technician Dennis Fellows.

I.T. staff provides technical support and maintenance for all of the City of Sterling's information technology equipment for all departments as well acting as technical contacts for software and hardware vendors used by the city.

The City's current wide area network (W.A.N.) is comprised of five local area networks (L.A.N.s) located at the Coliseum building, the main Fire Station, the Fire Sub-station, the Public Works facility, and the Waste Water Treatment plant. The local area networks are all interconnected via fiber optic connectivity provided through the IFiber network.

The Coliseum L.A.N. hosts all of the City's main technology systems which are housed in a server room located in the I.T. Department within the Coliseum building. The Coliseum L.A.N. acts as the central hub for these services which are distributed throughout the W.A.N. to all city departments and facilities.

Some of the main distributed services are:

- Voice over Internet Protocol telephone service and voice mail service.





PEER JURY

The Police Department Peer Jury program began in October of 1996. The Peer Jury program is an innovative alternative used to divert non-violent first time offenders from formal court action. Offenders who agree to participate are judged by a jury of their peers and may be sentenced to public service. Failure to comply with the sentence violates the agreement and brings the offender into contact with Whiteside County Court Services.

EXPLORERS

The Sterling Police Department Explorers Post 613 was chartered in 1994. The Law Enforcement Explorers program is a branch of the Boy Scouts of America for young men and women ages 14 to 20. Explorers learn the fundamentals of law enforcement through interaction with department personnel.



The judges at the 2016 Rockford Police Explorer Competition sat up and took notice when a Sterling teen flexed his muscles – as well they should have. Leon Ramos did 60 sit-ups in as many seconds and it earned him a third-place award in the regional event.

It was one of three awards the Sterling Police Department's Explorer Post brought home Saturday from the competition at Guilford High School in Rockford. Sixteen police Explorer Posts from agencies in northern Illinois competed in events, including traffic stops, arrest-and-search situations, domestic crisis intervention, investigation, and other various law enforcement functions. A physical fitness test was also held, in which top performers earned awards. Sterling Police Department's Explorer Post earned second place in the domestic violence event and fourth place in the traffic stop event. Ramos, 18, took third place in the sit-up competition by doing 60 sit-ups in a minute. According to a news release from the Sterling Police Department, the Law Enforcement Exploring Program provides training programs for young adults on the purposes, mission, and objectives of law enforcement.

DRUG COURT

The Whiteside County Drug Court is a multi-agency judicial system in which non-violent offenders with a high risk of illegal drug abuse can defer their prosecution, and enter into an intensive treatment program with the emphasis on recovery, supervision, and accountability. The Whiteside County Drug Court team consists of a 14th Circuit Judge, and members from the Whiteside County State's Attorney's Office, Whiteside County Public Defender's Office, Whiteside County Court Services/Probation, Sinnissippi Center, Lutheran Social Services, Whiteside County Sheriff's Office, and the Sterling Police Department.

Sergeant Joshua Weber and Youth Officer Ryan Potthoff are assigned members of the Whiteside County Drug Court, and regularly attend staff meetings with the team. Sergeant Weber and Officer Potthoff are relied on to provide pertinent information relating to the needs and supervision of Drug Court participants. Among other responsibilities, they also provide assistance and security to Probation Officers while conducting home visits and searches.

Halloween Flashlight Giveaway

For the 8th year, the Sterling Police Department has teamed together with many local business' to provide children with Halloween goodie bags. The bags consisted of a flashlight and batteries, pencil, pizza coupon, Halloween safety information and of course – candy! Children are encouraged to dress up and come to a designated location to meet with a police personnel and receive their goodie bag.

This promotion was developed to heighten awareness of pedestrian traffic during trick-or-treat hours.

Due to the generous donations received, over 300 trick-or-treat bags were given away.

CHAPLAINS PROGRAM

The Police Chaplain program is staffed by volunteer pastors who rotate in a weekly on call status and ride along with officers to better serve the needs of the community. Their purpose is to provide care, comfort, guidance and encouragement.

Chaplains counsel domestic violence victims, respond on-call when needed for traumatic events, and deliver death messages. They often provide a calming influence in a tense situation.



NATIONAL NIGHT OUT


